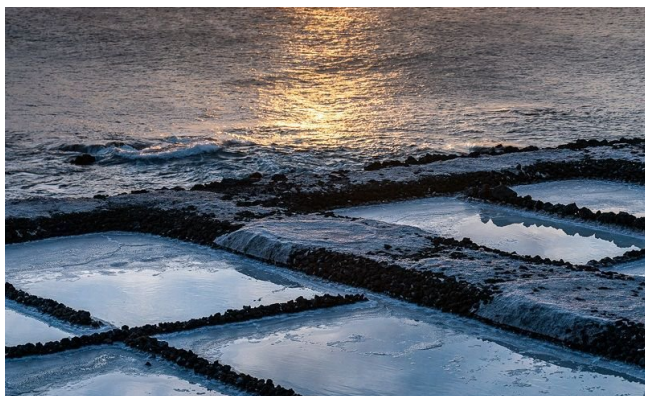
Las Salinas de Fuencaliente is a place where tradition and artisan work converge to produce pure Sal Marina Teneguía sea salt. A space of chromatic contrast that exudes magic. A family business that respects nature, handed down from children to grandchildren, continues the artisanal work of extracting sea salt, keeping the same trade name, Sal Marina Teneguía, in homage to the island's last eruption. The Teneguía volcano sprinkled this story with its ashes, halting the construction of the salt pans for a year.

Ornithologists, botanists and scientists have come to study this landscape in depth — so much so that in 1994 it was declared a Natural Area as a Site of Scientific Interest (LENAC 12/1994, of 19 December). The salt pans have been growing since 1967 to their current extent of 35,000 m², thanks to the support of one of UNESCO's most important programmes in 1994.

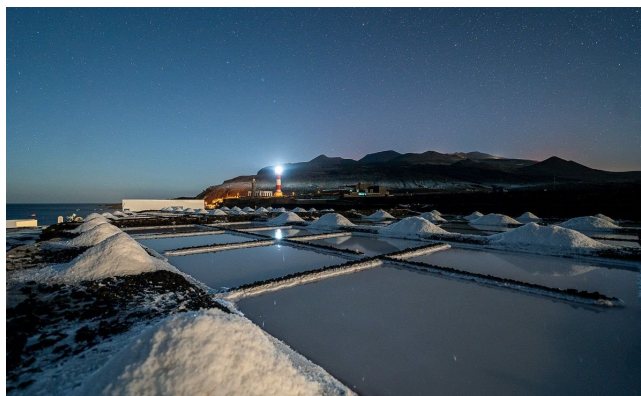
The salt-pan complex has become a point of reference among the island's natural and scenic visits, bringing together a historical, cultural, natural, botanical and geological reality like few others. And the salt shines not only because of the constant sun and the heat of the young earth, but also after sunset, when the lighthouses that light up the nights in the south of La Palma awaken.
